

# Give Generously: Today Is Outreach Sunday

Each summer, one Sunday is designated Outreach Sunday, and the funds from that week's chapel offering are given by the Outreach Committee to support community organizations on the Mountain. This year Outreach Sunday is today, July 21, and your offerings will go to the very worthy non-profit aid organization, the Community Fund of the South Cumberland Plateau.

Co-chaired by MSSA's Scott Parrish, the CFSCP was created in 2012 with an anchor gift from the Monteagle Assembly. Its mission is 'to improve the quality of life across the plateau, from Beersheba Springs to Sewanee, by increasing philanthropic giving and providing community leadership.' The Foundation's first grants, totaling over \$100,000, were distributed in November 2012 to 11 different organizations, including the Beersheba Springs Medical Clinic, the Grundy County Food Bank, and Mountain T.O.P. The seven June 2013 grant recipients include the Blue Monarch women's shelter, the Mountain Goat Trail Alliance, and North Elementary School in Grundy County.

The Outreach Committee has also been able to give funds directly to the following Monteagle organizations:

- \$500 to the May Justus Memorial Library (the public library in Monteagle)
- \$300 to the Monteagle Volunteer Fire Dept.

You can still give to Outreach even if you didn't come prepared to give on Sunday (or you'd like to give again!). Funds will be collected in the office for the rest of the season and beyond. Make checks to MSSA, and write "for Outreach" on the memo line. The Assembly's support of and involvement in the Community Fund increases the giving power of the new and important philanthropic organization, and helps support the growth and health of Mountain communities.

The Reverend Charles Foster Johnson, Guest Minister. Charles Foster Johnson serves on the pastoral team of Bread Fellowship, Fort Worth, TX, and as pastor of the First Baptist Church of Desdemona, TX. Born in Alabama, he grew up in Pensacola, FL, and earned degrees from Mississippi College and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. During his 30-year ministry he has served churches in MS, KY, TN, and TX. In 2006-2008 he served as Visiting Instructor of Preaching at the McAfee School of Theology at Mercer University, Atlanta, and he has also taught at Baptist University of the Americas, San Antonio. Johnson is a frequent preacher and speaker in university, church and business circles. He is involved in civic and denominational life and was named "Baptist of the Year" by the Baptist Center for Ethics in 2004. His ministry has been marked by active concern for social justice and inclusiveness, and in 2008 he was inducted into the Martin Luther King Jr. Board of Preachers of Morehouse College. Rev. Johnson is married to Jana Powers Corley and has three grown children.

Robert Tarter and NHECM, Natural History Educator/Presenter. Wildlife biologist Robert Tarter owns and manages The Natural History Educational Company of the Midsouth (NHECM), based in Columbia, TN. An avid conservationist and wildlife enthusiast, Bob is living his life-long dream of working with animals. After earning a degree in Natural Resources and Environmental Sciences, Bob worked as a wildlife biologist for the Indiana Dept. of Natural Resources and Ducks Unlimited. He then began working for the Natural History Education Company ("NHEC"), soon acquiring the rights to their programs in TN, AL, AR & MS and thereafter forming the Natural History Educational Company of the Midsouth (NHECM), which brings live animal educational programs to locations throughout the Southeast.

Nancy Strachan, Lecturer. A native of eastern Virginia, Nancy Strachan is Founder and President of Rwandan HUGS, Inc., a ministry she began after visiting Rwanda in 2007 with genocide survivor Immauculee Ilibagiza, author of Left to Tell: Discovering God amidst the Rwandan Holocaust. Nancy and her Scottish husband Leslie are co-owners of a unique jewelry business, Shiny Stuff, home of www.teapotjewelry.com. She began her jewelry career in 1990 after 15 years as a professional librarian. She is a member of St. John's Episcopal Church in Bedford, VA, and has been active in area service organizations. Nancy has traveled widely in Europe, Asia, Africa, North America and South America, but a 2007 trip to Rwanda changed her life. It inspired her to launch a ministry that informs Americans about radical forgiveness and the miracles of reconciliation in Rwanda while providing hope, opportunity, and friendship to thousands of people she now calls "family" in Rwanda.

James Acker, Youth Workshop Instructor. James Acker has spent every summer of his life coming to Monteagle as part of the fifth generation in his family associated with the Assembly. This summer, James will share his love of stories and movies in 4-day documentary film-making workshops for kids of various ages. A former summer Assembly youth staff member and a 2012 graduate of Moorestown High School in New Jersey, James has just completed his first year in the film program at Philadelphia's Drexel University.

**Jim Rogers,** Lecturer & Workshop Instructor. Jim Rogers, owner of Jim Rogers Photography in Dallas, TX, is a graduate of Southern Methodist University. He has worked in marketing/ advertising/pubic relations virtually his entire professional life. Jim's love of photography began in high school and has continued through his career. In his retirement, the photographic medium remains a driving force in Jim's day-to-day activities, allowing him to remain active with a select clientele including The First Tee, Plein Air Magazine, and The Outdoor Painters Society of America. Jim's photography has won an Annual Report Graphics Award of Excellence and has been displayed in art galleries and museums including the Museum of Fine Art in Longview, TX, and the Rocky Mountain Arts Council Gallery in Estes Park, CO. Norris Nelson Gagnet, Youth Workshop Instructor. Norris Gagnet has loved photography since high school, photographing the unique architecture of her New Orleans surroundings. After earning degrees in early childhood education and teaching for 10 years, motherhood led Norris to upgrade her camera equipment to better capture the moment. With the encouragement of friends and family, Norris eventually started taking child and family portraits in natural light, and her photographic business was born. Norris feels passionately that everyone should have good pictures of the people, places, and events they treasure, and she enjoys helping others improve their photographic skills. Ms. Gagnet taught very successful photography workshops during the Assembly's 2010 & 2012 summer seasons, and her photographs have featured prominently in several recent season program books.

Gale Zucker, Lecturer. Join Gale Zucker, is a commercial photographer whose location photography work has taken her from the White House to Navajo sheep corrals. Her talk at the Assembly will feature 'behind the scenes' stories plus tips to enliven your own photography. With a degree in photojournalism from the University of Minnesota, Gale began her career as a stringer for The New York Times, at the same time fulfilling regular assignments from many other national publications. She continues to photograph for magazines while expanding her commercial, institutional, and non-profit clientele. Gale's experience and resourcefulness in lighting varied environments earned her the title "Lighting Master" in a Photo District News profile. She is the photographer/co-author of the book *Craft Activism* (Random House/Clarkson Potter), and Shear Spirit (Random House), a coffee-table book that combines photography with knitting, yarn, and the fiber-farming life across the U.S. In 2008 Gale photographed Mason Dixon Knitting: Outside the Lines (Random House/Clarkson Potter) on location in TN and NY. Gale teaches photography workshops and is an experienced speaker. When not photographing, traveling, knitting or dog wrangling, Gale can be found in shoreline Connecticut with her family.

Sara Hines, Lecturer. Architect and urbanist Hines was born in Memphis, TN, and as a child was introduced to Monteagle, where her mother had visited as a teenager. Sara studied fine art and architecture at Washington University in St. Louis, and she is currently a registered architect based in Ashland, MA. Her career has taken her into urban design and a search for how the structure of both buildings and the places between them conspire to create the communities and places that we love and cherish. When she visited Oak Bluff Camp Meeting on Martha's Vineyard, Sara was amazed at the powerful sense of community still present in a place in existence since 1830. At the height of the movement in the 19th century there were as many as 3000 Camp Meeting Grounds, including numerous Chautauqua communities. Today there are still 1000 of them, some perfectly preserved and active, others sadly in failing condition. What started as an outing on a summer day has turned into a journey to find, document and understand these remarkable places and how they continue to offer the opportunity for a multi-generational experience of community that is surprisingly strong. Sara's research investigates what makes for a typical Camp Meeting cottage; why the size and space matters; how even without religion these streets, densities, and human-scaled tents and cottages work to create community; and what lessons might be learned from these places about living simply and well.

Ellie Patrick Lovvorn, Exercise (Zumba) Instructor. Ellie Lovvorn has been coming to the Assembly since she was 2 months old and is the grand-daughter of Assembly member Harry Lee Billington. Ellie worked as part of the youth staff for four years in Hummingbirds. She then went to the University of TN and graduated with a Masters in Education. Ellie now teaches third grade in Athens, AL, where she lives with her husband, Jeb, and their 5-year-old twin daughters. Ellie is certified to teach Zumba and Kickboxing. She teaches Zumba, Kickboxing and Muscle-works at a local gym in Athens, and we are pleased to have Ellie teach morning exercise during two weeks this summer.
