# On Tap This Week at the Assembly

The third week of the season is already here — the season goes by so quickly! We have a number of exciting events coming this week, starting with two events with Michael Hall, an expert on Southern Decorative Arts who has been dealing in American antiques for more than 20 years. On Wednesday evening, he will discuss his experiences collecting Southern Decorative Arts. Then on Friday, you may bring your American pieces, including paintings, furniture, clocks, silver, pottery, and samplers, to the Auditorium from 11 am-12 noon for an appraisal. No advance registration is required. Photos of larger items will also be evaluated.

Another focus this week will be on issues related to the environment, particularly as it relates to spiritual life. This week's guest minister, the Rev. Roger Senechal, will present "Finding God in Honey Bees" on Monday, drawing on his experiences in beekeeping. Dabney Dixon joins us Tuesday to discuss "Biodiversity: Reasons to Care." Dixon is a professor of chemistry at Georgia State University, and outside of her teaching, she lectures frequently on sustainable living and the importance of biodiversity.

The Assembly will travel back in time to Jane Austen's era with a pair of events on Thursday. June Mays will discuss "Jane Austen and the British Landscape," drawing on her education and experiences in British gardening. That evening, we will screen "Pride and Prejudice" in the Auditorium.

Finally, Bob Farnsworth of the World War II Museum in New Orleans joins us Monday for an  $8:15 \mathrm{pm}$  lecture, "Building the National WWII Museum: Connecting the Greatest Generation with the Next Generation" in Warren Chapel.

## **Week 3 Platform Guests**

John Benson, Lecturer. John Benson has been Director of the Outdoor Program at the University of the South for 13 years and maintains all of the Sewanee trails. He enjoys walking the Sewanee trails with his wife, Emily Puckette (math professor at the university), son Elliott, and Joe dog. In addition to hiking, he enjoys teaching Sewanee students canoeing, caving (vertical and horizontal), climbing, mountaineering, running, cycling and backpacking.

Dabney Dixon, Lecturer. Dabney Dixon is a Professor of Chemistry at Georgia State University. She received her B.A. from Brown University and her Ph.D. from MIT. Her research involves studies of the mechanism of heme uptake in pathogenic bacteria. She is the Coordinator of Science Education Initiatives for the University. In this context, she works with faculty members throughout science and mathematics to enhance the effectiveness of their courses. This involves development of new teaching approaches, institution of evidence-based teaching methods, and enhancement of interdisciplinary efforts. In the sustainability area, she was instrumental in the creation of the University Senate Sustainability Committee and currently serves as its chair. The goal of this Committee is to enhance environmental awareness and responsibility, and to promote sustainability on campus and in the lives of the University graduates. Outside the University, she lectures on making choices for a sustainable lifestyle and the importance of biodiversity.

Bob Farnsworth, Lecturer. Bob Farnsworth joined The National WWII Museum in January 2004. As Senior Vice President of Capital Programs, Bob manages the capital expansion program. He is responsible for working with City and State regulatory agencies on issues impacting the capital expansion, negotiating the design and construction agreements, supervising the architects and contractors, coordinating the design and fabrication of the exhibits, developing and managing the comprehensive capital expansion budget, working with the Executive Director and the CFO to develop annual budgets and the cost reporting program and supports fund raising activities in the private and public sectors. Bob has 25 years experience as a general contractor and 19 years experience representing owner's interests in major developments. He was Director of Design and Construction for development of the Harrah's New Orleans Casino. Following that he went to work for Columbus General Properties as Executive Vice President for Design and Construction and managed the development of the Navy Information and Technology Center at the UNO Research and Technology Park and the Belle Chasse Academy School, the first charter school on a military base. He is past president of the Associated General Contractors of Louisiana and a former member of YPO. He served on the Boards of Ideal Savings and Loan, Metairie Park Country Day School, the Louisiana SPCA, the Louisiana Children's Museum and Belle Chasse Academy Charter School. He is currently on the Board of the New Orleans Federal Alliance (Federal Building) and Ursuline Academy. He has a B.S. in business and a Juris Doctor from Loyola University.

Michael Hall, Lecturer. Michael has been dealing in American Antiques for over 20 years and is recognized internationally by collectors and institutions as one of the country's foremost experts on Southern Decorative arts. Michael and Margo participate in the country's top antique shows and many of their pieces are used in Museum exhibitions. Michael has been a guest lecturer throughout the South. He has helped clients put together collections that have been published in *Antiques Magazine, Art and Antiques*, and most recently *Collecting KY by GIGI*. His antiques are regularly featured in Maine Antique Digest. He is also an Appraiser on PBS's

Antiques Roadshow where he's considered a silver expert. He and his wife Margo enjoy their successful antiques' business where they sell, appraise, and help clients even curate their pieces. He has set many auction records. He's placed pieces in major collections from Yale to MESDA.

June Mays, Lecturer. June Mays enjoyed a 31-year career as a financial advisor in Birmingham with a major Wall Street firm. During that time, Warner Books published her Women's Guide to Financial Self Defense, a book she spoke about during the Monteagle Assembly about 15 years ago. Now she is enjoying a second career as a garden designer, writer, and lecturer. She spent a year studying garden design at the English Gardening School in London and has designed or consulted on over 100 gardens since her return to the US. She has spoken at Tryon Palace in New Bern NC, the Chattanooga Nature Center, Callaway Gardens, the Augusta Georgia Garden Festival, the Festival of Flowers in Mobile, the Herb Society of America annual meeting in Austin, TX, the Homestead Resort Garden Symposium in Hot Springs Virginia, the Birmingham Botanical Garden, Aldridge Gardens, and at numerous garden clubs and master gardener groups. She has written for Southern Accents, Flower, Lowe's Creative Ideas, Birmingham Home and Garden, The American Gardener, The Alabama Gardener, and the DIY Network website.
