Great Week for Platform!


Platform’s Week 3 program features an eclectic mix of performances and lectures that emphasize music, culture, and history. In a rare out-of-Nashville performance, the radio program Music City Roots brings its show to the Auditorium on Friday evening for a 7pm show, with doors opening at 6pm. Box dinners are available for pre-order at the office through Wednesday, June 24. The Music City Roots will feature music, interviews, and everything fans of the show have come to expect.

The history of Charles Lindbergh’s historic flight across the Atlantic will come to life when performer Steve Carroll brings his show, “Charles Lindbergh: The Lone Eagle” to Warren Chapel Tuesday at 8:15pm. Carroll first developed and produced the show in June 2001. In the years since, he has taken his show to professional theaters, colleges, high schools, historical societies, senior centers, museums, libraries, country clubs, and aviation groups all around the country. The president of the Charles A. and Anne Morrow Lindbergh Foundation endorsed the play, and Carroll performed the show for Lind-



bergh’s daughter on the 75th anniversary of the famous transatlantic flight.

- **No mowing on Sundays**, please!

- **Call Scott First!**: Only routine house cleaning and lawn care are permissible during the season. If you need to make an emergency repair to your cottage during the season, please contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.
- **Don't Get Ticketed!**: To avoid getting a ticket, remember to have your auto permit on the dash of your car at all times while you are on Assembly Grounds. Carry your gate tickets with you, even if you're on a golf cart.
- **Dining Hall Accounts**: For cash-free dining, be sure to set up a Dining Hall account in advance through the Main Office.
- Eliminate waiting time by **PRE-ORDERING YOUR GATE TICKETS**. You can do so off the web site or by calling the office 931-924-2286. We will have your tickets waiting at the gate for you to pick up. A great way to make your guests' visits easier, too!
- **Golf Cart Regulations**: All new golf carts must be registered with the office. State law requires that anyone driving a golf cart must be a licensed driver. The MSSA Board has adopted a zero tolerance policy on violations. Your cottage number must appear on both sides of your cart!
- **Grounds**: Lawn trimmings will be collected every Wednesday.



The Reverend Adam Nunley, *Guest Minister.* Adam Nunley is currently the Director of Discipleship at Grace Christian Academy in Franklin, TN. He works with elementary through high school students, and some of his many “hats” include teaching Bible, speaking at chapel, and overseeing missions. Adam has always been passionate about ministering to students. He worked in the public school system as a high school teacher and football coach for 5 years in Hendersonville, TN. He then felt called to full time ministry, and decided to pursue a seminary degree while serving as the middle school pastor at New Vision Baptist Church from 2009-2014. Adam graduated from Tennessee Tech University with a Bachelor’s in Education. He holds a Masters of Arts in Family Ministry and Discipleship from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Adam not only loves building relationships with students, but also working with families. He enjoys encouraging men in their role as a father through father/son camp experiences, rites of passage ceremonies, father/son group Bible Studies and one-on-one meetings. Adam has been married to his wife Elizabeth for ten years and they have two children: Miller, 4 and Lucy Kate, 2. He loves reading, watching good movies/TV shows, spending time with friends and family, playing pick-up basketball and a good cup of coffee.

Lee Boynton, *Workshop Instructor.* Light has color and the color of light changes hourly throughout the course of the day, and also through the seasons of the year. Lee Boynton has been teaching his students “to see the light” for over 30 years. He is passionate about stewarding the artistic legacy first established and developed by Claude Monet, the father of Impressionism. Lee paints in both the oil and watercolor mediums. Intrigued with how the Impressionist theories of color and light would translate from oil to watercolor, a medium with a more translucent quality, Lee pioneered effective techniques for capturing the subtle effects of light with watercolor. He co-authored *Painting the Impressionist Watercolor* with one of his longtime watercolor students. For more about Lee you are welcome to visit his website: www.leeboynton.com.

Steve Carroll, *Performer.* Steve Carroll was an original member of The Meat and Potatoes Company in New York City, where he appeared in a wide variety of Off-Broadway productions ranging from the plays of William Shakespeare and Jean Cocteau to William Inge and Jean Genet. Since 1977, he has worked extensively in theatre, commercials, films and daytime dramas. You may have spotted him as Dr. Matt Rawlins on ABC-TV’s *One Life To Live*. In 2011, Mr. Carroll played a featured role in a new film called “Beautiful Noise,” which received an unprecedented six sold out screenings at the Sarasota Film Festival. The film is now touring the festival circuit as its producers seek national distribution. In 1998, he was called to China to portray U.S. State Department head John Carter Vincent in a 30-part series for Chinese television called *A War of China’s Fate*. The series examined the birth of The People’s Republic, which aired in 1999 and became a national sensation in China. It was there, during a break in shooting, the genesis for *Charles Lindbergh: The Lone Eagle* came at the suggestion of fellow actor Bob Brown, who performs his own one-man show on the life of Benedict Arnold. In June of 2001 Mr. Carroll first produced and performed *Charles Lindbergh: The Lone Eagle*, at New Jersey Repertory Company. It earned the endorsement of Reeve Lindbergh, president of The Charles A. and Anne Morrow Lindbergh Foundation, who saw a command performance of the play the following year in Garden City, N.Y. at the 75th anniversary celebration of her father’s famous flight to Paris. Since then, Mr. Carroll has toured the show to professional theaters, colleges, high schools, historical societies, senior centers, museums, libraries, country clubs, and aviation groups all around the country.

Sherry Guyear, *Lecturer.* Sherry was born and raised in Grundy, spent 30+ years teaching K-3 grade in the area and is now employed by Discover Together where she brings her passion for children and families to those participating in Discover Together programs. Sherry loves teaching, believes in connecting children and parents to their community, and was recognized last year on Scholastic’s blog, “On Our Minds” as one of 5 inspiring teachers from across the country.

Pamela Macfie, *Lecturer.* Educated at Goucher College and Duke University, Pamela Royston Macfie teaches Shakespeare, Dante, and English Renaissance Literature at the University of the South, where she is the Samuel R. Williamson Distinguished University Professor. At Sewanee, she has chaired both the college’s Interdisciplinary Humanities Program and its Department of English. She has been a strong advocate for the liberal arts, especially through work for the Phi Beta Kappa Society. Interested in early modern poets’ often mysterious dialogue with the past and their canny influence on the future, she has published work on Dante and Ovid; Marlowe and Ovid, Lucan, and Colluthus; and Shakespeare and the Classics. She has also written on contemporary productions of Shakespeare at the Royal Shakespeare Company (Stratford) and the Globe (Bankside, London), at London’s Old Vic, and in several venues featuring London’s Cheek by Jowl. Having recently completed “Shakespeare, Ovid, and the Poetry of Surprise” for Ashgate’s Shakespeare and the Classics, she is now making final revisions on her book, *Summoning the Past*, which assesses the theory and practice of early modern allusion. Looking ahead, she is interested in determining if a study of Shakespeare’s dewdrops might prove fruitful. Summers often find Pamela in Southwest Harbor, Maine or Oxford, England. This year, she will revel in a Sewanee summer, at least until July 18, when, having taught her final class on Dante’s Poetry of Transformation in Sewanee’s School of Letters, she will decamp for Maine, joining her husband Tom, University Chaplain and Dean of All Saints’ Chapel.

Troy Marden, *Lecturer.* With a career spanning more than 25 years, Troy Marden is a true Renaissance man in the world of horticulture and design. An award-winning garden and floral designer with a passion for plants, Troy’s career began as a teenager working in a retail nursery and garden center near his hometown in north central Kansas. His college years found him focusing heavily on greenhouse management and production, eventually leading to internships at two of the country’s most esteemed public gardens, Callaway Gardens in Pine Mountain, Georgia and the world-renowned Longwood Gardens—a former DuPont estate—in Kennett Square, Pennsylvania. For the past 20 years, Troy has called Nashville home and has continued to grow his business and his brand by venturing into the worlds of garden and floral design, special events, garden photography, writing, public speaking and television. He is watched each week by tens of thousands of viewers across the state of Tennessee on Nashville Public Television’s hit gardening show *Volunteer Gardener* and his gardens, floral design, writing and photography have appeared in both regional and national gardening magazines, including *Horticulture*, *Fine Gardening*, *Garden Design*, *Southern Living*, and *Tennessee Gardener* among others. Troy’s one-of-a-kind floral creations have appeared at many of Nashville’s premier fundraisers and special events and have been featured in special shows at both the New York and Chicago Botanical Gardens. He is a popular lecturer, known for his engaging style and his ability to connect with gardeners of every skill level and he has addressed groups on the topic of gardening from Boston to Portland and from Montreal to

Bonnie McCardell, Lecturer. Bonnie McCardell has been involved in connections between the University and the local community since moving to Sewanee in 2010 when her husband, John McCardell, was named Vice Chancellor of the University of the South. She has an MEd in preschool special education and has been involved in advocacy efforts for children and families for many years. She currently serves on the Board of the South Cumberland Community Fund.

Keri Moser, Workshop Presenter/Guest Chef. Ivy Wild chef, Keri Moser offers playful, offbeat cuisine. "Moser sees compositions in colors and landscapes, and she works backward to edit in ingredients and techniques, building her plates with improbably good and often wild flavor combinations. Moser nods occasionally to the region's Southern foodways—and supports them wholeheartedly as a champion of local farmers—but her food reflects a deep curiosity, an artistic bent, and a creative streak that's unencumbered by the culinary establishment or her small-town status. Music City Roots, Performers. Music City Roots, Nashville's acclaimed multi-platform showcase for the finest roots and Americana music, heads to the Assembly for a rare show outside of its home base at The Factory at Franklin TN. Hosted by Grammy-winning songwriter and country/bluegrass artist Jim Lauderdale, Tennessee Broadcasting Hall of Famer Keith Bilbrey and author/interviewer Craig Havighurst, Music City Roots looks back to early radio broadcasts and forward to the future with a mix of musical styles and artistic visions. It features tradition and innovation in equal measure, scanning Middle Tennessee and beyond for the best songwriting, classic country, bluegrass, folk, blues, soul, gospel and rock and roll. All ages will find something to love in this fast-paced live show. Artists currently scheduled include songwriter/cellist Ben Sollee, country throwback Woody Pines, Ashleigh Caudill, and The Tattletale Saints.

Cruel Shoes, Performers. Based in Nashville, TN, "Cruel Shoes" is a rock 'n roll cover band that has performed for numerous past Assembly dances. The band is fronted by longtime Monteagle friend Clark Hudgins who along with band mates Brooks Odom, David Horn and Kelly Phillips and newest member Wanda Sheppard have been making music together since 1988. "Cruel Shoes" draws from a diverse collection of cover music from the heyday of classic rock through contemporary hits to blues & R&B.
