History and Art, Among Other Things

Week 4 has a delightful mix of history and art, along with the much-anticipated July 4th festivities your family loves. Make sure you check out the bulletin boards for the full set of events this week!

Thursday night features an evening with Sewanee graduate and author Jon Meacham. He will talk Thursday evening on the topic of his latest book, “Thomas Jefferson: The Art of Power.” A *New York Times* bestselling author, Meacham’s books include *American Lion*, for which he won the Pulitzer Prize, *Franklin and Winston*, and *American Gospel*. Meacham is an executive editor at Random House, a contributing editor to *Time* magazine, and regularly teaches courses at Vanderbilt University and the University of the South. He is working on a new book, *The Last Gentleman*, a biography of George H.W. Bush, to be released in the fall of 2015.



Also featured this week is legendary photographer Charles Harbutt, who will lecture on the topic of “Romance for the Real” Monday at 11am in Warren Chapel. Harbutt has taught at the Parsons School of Design at New School University, as well as serving as a guest artist at MIT, the Art Institute of Chicago, and the Rhode Island School of Design. He was a founding member of Archive Pictures, an international documentary photographers’ cooperative. His work has been exhibited at the Museum of Modern

Art, the National Museum of American History, the Corcoran Gallery, the Art Institute of Chicago, and many other prestigious museums. Harbutt will also hold a photography workshop Monday from 2-4:30pm. Participation is limited, but there is no fee for the workshop; however, participants must have a gate ticket for the day. Bring photographs for discussion, or come to the workshop to learn from others.

- **Dining Hall Accounts:** For cash-free dining, be sure to set up a Dining Hall account in advance at the Office.
- Eliminate waiting time by **PRE-ORDERING YOUR GATE TICKETS**. You can do so off the web site or by calling the office 931-924-2286. We will have your tickets waiting at the gate for you to pick up. A great way to make your guests' visits easier, too!
- **Golf Cart Regulations:** All new golf carts must be registered with the office. State law requires that anyone driving a golf cart must be a licensed driver. The MSSA Board has adopted a zero tolerance policy on violations. Cottage numbers must appear on both sides of your cart!
- Don't forget to come to the **Thursday Morning Mountain Market** from 7-10am in front of the Harton Dining Hall. Come early to be sure to get the freshest flowers and local goodies.
- **Grounds:** Lawn trimmings will be collected every Wednesday.
- **New project?** The next deadline to submit a plan for ARC approval is July 15th.
- **Dog owners:** Please do not forget to pick up after your dog answers nature's call! It is important that we maintain a safe, clean environment for all.

- The **pool will be open** every Tuesday and Thursday from 8-9:00am beginning June 30th for adult lap swim and water exercise.
- **It's a Tradition (and a regulation, too):** Each day from 1:00 - 2:30 PM is observed as Quiet Hour throughout the Assembly. Children should remain in their cottages, reading, playing games, or resting. Tennis should only be played on the East Gate courts. Please respect the daily Quiet Hour tradition. No deliveries during quiet hours, please!
- **Adult Tennis Clinics:** Sewanee tennis player Robert Corey will offer tennis clinics and private/small-group lessons for the remainder of the season. The Rev. Eric Liles, Guest Minister. Eric began his cure as the Rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Ivy, VA in March 2012. St. Paul's is a beautiful, historical, active, and growing parish just west of Charlottesville. Before being called to St. Paul's, Eric served as Associate Rector at St. John's Episcopal Church, Decatur, AL (February 2010- February 2012), and prior to this as Rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Smiths Station, AL (June 2007-January 2010). Eric met his wife Allison while both were seminarians at Virginia Theological Seminary. They have two wonderful and energetic children; Hill, age 6, and Paillet, age 3. Eric grew up in Bakersfield, CA until age 14 and then in Richmond, TX. He earned a B.A. in Biology from Texas A&M University, an M.Div. from VTS, and has just finished his D.Min. at the School of Theology: The University of the South. In his free time Eric enjoys playing guitar, cycling, reading, and the occasional round of golf.

John Bordley, Performer. John Bordley retired in 2011 from The University of the South, having taught chemistry at Sewanee for forty-one years. He has played the carillon at Sewanee since 2001 and was named university carillonneur in April 2013. He passed the examination to become a Carillonneur member of the Guild of Carillonneurs in North America (GCNA) in 2003. While on sabbatical leave during the 2005-2006 school year he was a fulltime student at the Royal Carillon School "Jef Denyn" in Mechelen, Belgium, receiving a certificate 'with distinction.' He is the editor of the guild's Bulletin.

"Good Ole Boys" Bluegrass Band, Musicians/Performers. This Monteagle based band has been playing and performing together for more than 25 years, and they are perennial favorites at the MSSA July 4th picnic. Guitarist Billy Terrill, bass player Bobby Lawson and banjo player Ken Malhoit have been part of the group since its inception, joined by Don Hill on fiddle.

Charles Harbutt, Lecturer/Workshop Presenter. Charles Harbutt's pictures have been widely collected and exhibited at (among others) the Museum of Modern Art, the Corcoran Gallery, the Art Institute of Chicago, and at the Beaubourg, the Bibliotheque Nationale and the Maison Europeene de la Photographie in Paris. He is represented by the Peter Fetterman Gallery, in Santa Monica, CA. In 1997, his negatives, master prints & archives were acquired for the collection of the Center for Creative Photography, Tucson, Ariz. He has had large recent exhibitions at Oaxaca (2013) and Tucson (2013-4) and participated in group shows at the Vienna Museum, the Moderna Museet in Stockholm, the Bibliotheque Nationale in Paris and the Arles Festival. In 2012 he was invited to give a Master exhibition and lecture at the Foto Festival in Bursa, Turkey. For the first twenty years of his

photographic life, Charles Harbutt was a photojournalist, working mostly through Magnum Photos (of which he was twice president) for magazines in Europe, Japan and the United States. Since 1980, he has pursued more personal interests, an extension of the boundaries of journalism past the exceptional into the realm of the everyday. He has been guest artist for a year each at the Rhode Island School of Design, MIT and the Art Institute of Chicago and taught at Cooper Union, Parsons, Pratt Institute, Bard College, the School of Visual Arts and in numerous workshops here and abroad. In 1999, he was appointed an associate professor at Parsons the New School for Design.

Josh Justice and NHECM, Natural History Educator/Presenter. Josh is currently a senior at University of Tennessee at Martin, majoring in wildlife biology. He has a background with over eleven years in the Navy as a nuclear trained Machinist Mate first class, but is excited to pursue this opportunity to share his fascination with reptiles to audiences all over. With over 20 years experience handling reptiles and amphibians, he has regularly provided wildlife outreach presentations to many local schools & organizations as well as working with inner city youth through the Great Outdoors University in Memphis, TN as well as many nature & conservation events.

Jon Meacham, Lecturer. Jon Meacham is the author, most recently, of *Thomas Jefferson: The Art of Power*, a No. 1 *New York Times* bestseller. He received the Pulitzer Prize for *American Lion*, his bestselling 2008 biography of Andrew Jackson. He is also the author of the *New York Times* bestsellers *Franklin and Winston* and *American Gospel*. Meacham, an executive editor at Random House, is a contributing editor to *Time* magazine and teaches at Vanderbilt and at Sewanee. He is at work on a biography of George H.W. Bush, entitled *The Last Gentleman*, to be published in the fall of 2015. A former trustee and Regent of The University of the South, Meacham has served on the vestries of St. Thomas Church Fifth Avenue and Trinity Church Wall Street. Born in Chattanooga in 1969, Meacham was educated at The McCallie School and at The University of the South. He and his wife live with their three children in Nashville and in Sewanee.

Nate Wilson, Lecturer. As Domain manager at the University of the South, Nate Wilson is responsible for the implementation of land management decisions across the Domain. Prior to his work for the University, he was a consultant in wildlife biology and forestry on the Cumberland Plateau where he worked primarily with private landowners and conservation NGOS. Wilson received his B.S. in Forestry and Wildlife Ecology in 2002 from the Warnell School of Forest Resources, University of Georgia and is Certified Wildlife Biologist.
