Homer has the nickname Taco because his mother craved tacos during her pregnancy. He has lived in the Monteagle, Altamont, and Jump




Off areas his whole life and has worked for the Assembly crew since June 2013.

A highlight of the 2013 event will be the keynote address by David Haskell, author of the acclaimed book, The Forest Unseen, on Saturday night during Wine & Wildflowers. Haskell, who will also lead guided walks on Saturday and Sunday, will be honored as the recipient of the Yeatman Environmental Education Award. The Trails & Trilliums Tribute Award will be presented to the new Tennessee Naturalist Program.

Other key events of the three-day festival include 15

varied hikes on some of the South Cumberland's most beautiful trails, a great selection of native

plants, the expanded "Brush with Nature" preview party / art sale on Friday night, the Cumberland Wild Forum. Gardens Gone Wild at the Humphries' cottage garden, workshops, music, food and vendors. A three-day nature journaling workshop will be held Wed.-Fri. mornings before the weekend events. A focus on families continues with "Ramble," the State Parks' raccoon mascot on stage along with native critters, kinder gardening, William's Wildflowers program, hayrides and an



introduction to rock climbing. All are activities that will spark kids' interest in wildlife, woods and wonder.

Proceeds from the weekend support South Cumberland State Park, the largest state wilderness park in Tennessee. A detailed schedule and a chance to pre-register coming soon to trailsandtrilliums.org.


Mark your Calendars for Exciting Events from the Woman's Association this Season!

Think about getting your books now for this year's Book Club. There are 3 books to be reviewed.




