Mosaics are an "art form" which basically involves creating images with an assemblage of small pieces of colored glass, stone, or other materials. This class is technique orientated and involves learning the methods used when creating a mosaic work of art. This basic knowledge will allow you to think "big" and start your first project. Each student will

select (prior) to class, ONE substrate desired for their mosaic piece. The selection includes a 14" circle, a 15" square, 12 x 16" rectangle or a 12 concrete stepping stone. (At registration in the MSSA office, these examples will be displayed, please write down your choice when you pay for the class.) Everything will be furnished for your project! I bring an ample amount of stained glass scraps, glass gems (small, medium and large), other glass decorative pieces, mirrors of all sizes, beads and costume jewelry, chains, several containers of stoneware and china used for pique assiette techniques. The wooden pieces are water sealed, painted on the back and equipped with heavy duty hangers. You will come to the class with a desire to learn about mosaics, create your first piece and return home with a unique work of art! *(limited registration; advance sign-up with MSSA gate ticket at MSSA Office, \$70 supply fee, max. # of participants 10.)* **(Registration ends Monday, July 23, 2018 in order for the selected wooden bases to be prepared.)**

PLEASE NOTE:**

1. MSSA gate tickets are required for ALL workshop participants. Non-Assembly residents must purchase gate tickets in order to participate in any/all Assembly workshops, whether registration is required or not. Please present your MSSA gate ticket at each workshop session.
2. Registration for workshops must be made at the MSSA business office during office hours: 8:00am-4:00pm, Monday – Friday, and 9:00am-3:00pm, Saturday during the summer program season.
3. Where a fee is required, no names will be added to a workshop registration list without accompanying payment by cash, check or credit card.

These lectures explore how archaeological excavations in Israel have shed interesting and in some cases provocative light on the history and religion of ancient Israel. We will examine together the artifacts and architecture that has come to life and put them beside the Old Testament texts to see what we insights we might glean. For example, for some time archaeologists have been digging into the soil of Jerusalem in an attempt to uncover the glorious temple and palace of King Solomon. What are the results of all this work? Have we found anything that points to the existence of such structures or are we at the point where we should read these texts in some other way than historically? These are some of the intriguing questions we will explore together. Mute stones have much to say once they are exposed and given a voice, and in our time together, we will listen closely to what they may teach us about the history and religion of ancient Israel and the Bible itself.

Over the course of these interactive and inspiring sessions, we will spend time building a mindful community and exploring how to intentionally build these life-nourishing practices into the moments of our days, the days of our summer and beyond. We will use movement, meditation, creativity and deep listening practices to identify and experience ways to weave more mindfulness, balance and gratitude into our busy lives. You can choose one or two sessions or join us for all four.

July 16 - Part One: 9:30am - 11:30am, “The Basics of Mindfulness Practice”

This session will offer a basic introduction to mindfulness including leading edge research on the benefits of regular mindfulness practice, some direct experience with sitting and movement practices and some practical tools to begin building your own practice.

July 16 - Part Two: 2:30pm - 4:30pm, “Gratitude and Balance”

In this session we will explore the negativity bias in our brains and learn about and experience mindfulness practices that intentionally cultivate more gratitude and balance in our lives.

July 17 - Part Three: 9:30am - 11:30am, “Finding Peace Amidst the Chaos”

Mindfulness isn’t a magic bullet. It won’t solve all of your problems, but the science shows that regular mindfulness practice builds more equanimity. In other words, through regular mindfulness practice, we begin to create enduring changes in our emotional regulation--our ability to calm down when upset or angry and to recover from adversity.

July 17 - Part Four: 2:30pm - 4:30pm, “Nature as a Source for Renewal”

This session will include journaling, creative exploration and mindfulness practices in connection with nature. We will spend some times outdoors weather permitting, or safe and dry inside using our imagination and some materials from nature.

Seldon has hosted many "Burns Night Dinners" and Single Cast Single Malt Scotch Whisky Tastings. Being of Scottish descent, Seldon is an active member in the Murray Clan Association of North America.

Neal serves as a deacon at his church. He enjoys community outreach, golf, plein air painting, travel, and reading with a particular interest in history. Neal has two daughters, and he and his wife, Melanie, are the owners of a historic Nashville home, "Lone Oak," a 100 year old English manor-style country house where Neal maintains his studio.

Erick New and Greg Campbell, Floral Demonstration/Lecturers, Week 7, GEORGE FERGUSON & ETHEL ARCHER FUND. Garden District, formerly John Hoover flowers, began in 1995 in a charming clapboard house in Midtown Memphis. Our shop was named in part because of the owners' love for New Orleans and in part because of its proximity to both Central Gardens and Chickasaw Gardens here in Memphis. In 2003, after outgrowing the

Taking watercolor lessons at age 10 started me on the path that I picked back up on in 2015 upon transitioning from a career in landscape architecture. Having achieved national recognition for art in high school and been selected as one of twenty from across N.C. to attend a state-sponsored summer program, known as "Governor's School", in the studio arts curriculum - I expanded into oils and acrylics. William Pratt is Professor of English Emeritus at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, where he taught for more than forty years as a specialist in Modern Literature and American Literature, especially Southern. He has a BA in English from the University of Oklahoma, and MA and PhD degrees in English from Vanderbilt University. In 1951-52, he was a Rotary International Foundation Fellow at the University of Glasgow, Scotland, and in 1975-76, he served as Fulbright Professor of American Literature at University College, Dublin, Ireland. He has lectured widely at home and abroad, and has given papers at many international literary conferences, including the Yeats and the Joyce Summer Schools in Ireland. From 1991-2005 he was Secretary of the Ezra Pound International Conference, which met in places where Pound lived and wrote, such as Rapallo, Venice, Rome, Paris, London, Dublin, and Brunnenburg castle in Italy, as well as Sun Valley, Idaho, near Pound's birthplace of Hailey, and Philadelphia, where Pound's literary career began. He has published poems, translations, critical essays and reviews in a number of literary magazines, and a total of twenty books, including two anthologies: *The Imagist Poem: Modern Poetry in Miniature* (now in its Third Edition) and *The Fugitive Poets: Modern Southern Poetry in Perspective* (now in its Second Edition). With his wife, Anne Rich Pratt (Founder's Medalist at Vanderbilt in 1952, MA in French, 1954), Instructor of French at Vanderbilt and Miami, he edited and translated René Taupin's *The Influence of French Symbolism on Modern American Poetry*. He has published two books of literary essays, *Singing the Chaos: Madness and Wisdom in Modern Poetry*, and *Ezra Pound and the Making of Modernism*. He discovered and co-edited Donald Davidson's unpublished novel, *The Big Ballad Jamboree*. His latest book is *Ezra Pound and Modernism, the Irish Factor*, published in England in 2017. His essays have appeared in several literary journals, including *The Sewanee Review*, and in 2015-16 he was President of the Literary Club of Cincinnati.

David Prehn, *Adventure Week Leader, Week 2*, THOMAS MALONE TRABUE, III FUND. David Prehn teaches upper school English and history at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School. Passionate about youth empowerment in the outdoors, he worked with City Kids Wilderness Project in Washington, D.C. and Jackson, Wyoming before his appointment at SAS. He is a 2016 graduate of the University of the South.

Sally Rainey, *Demonstrator, Week 6*, MISS BESSIE FUND. Sally Rainey from Jackson, TN earned her BA from Mississippi University for Women in Columbus, MS. From 2005 to 2010, he served as the Cathedral Conservator at Washington National Cathedral, where he was responsible for the care of the Cathedral's building fabric, along with managing its fine arts collections. John's book, *Searching for Sacred Space: Essays on Architecture and Liturgical Design in the Episcopal Church*, is a collection of thought-provoking essays that focus on liturgical space and its proper support of common worship. He regularly speaks at conferences and retreats on the theology of sacred space and history of religious architecture, as well as teaches at several seminaries.

Dr. Seddon served as the Assistant Chief Medical Officer of the Vanderbilt Medical Group in Nashville, Tennessee for 11 years. There she led an initiative aimed at improving patient safety, quality of care, and team effectiveness by the use of an aviation-based model of Crew Resource Management. She is a founding partner of LifeWings Partners, LLC which teaches this concept to healthcare institutions across the United States. A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley with a degree in physiology, Dr. Seddon received her MD degree from the University of Tennessee College of Medicine in Memphis, where she completed her residency in General Surgery. Dr. Seddon lives in Murfreesboro, Tennessee with her husband and fellow astronaut Captain Robert "Hoot" Gibson and their children. She has been inducted into the Tennessee Aviation Hall of Fame, the Astronaut Hall of Fame and the Tennessee Women's Hall of Fame. She received the Athena International Leadership Award for Rutherford County in 2016. Her memoir, *Go for Orbit*, was published in 2015 and received a gold medal from the Independent Book Publishers Association.

Thom Schuyler has been an integral part of the music community since arriving in Nashville in 1978. His immediate and significant success in the field of songwriting afforded him further opportunities as a recording artist, music publisher, record label executive and community leader. Thom's career-long affiliation with BMI has rewarded him with an impressive list of recognitions including Millionaire Certifications for

his compositions 16th Avenue, I Don't Know Where to Start, A Long Line of Love, Life Gets Away, I Fell in Love Again Last Night, Love Out Loud and Point of Light. He also received a Two Million Play award for Love Will Turn You Around. Other top-ten, award-winning songs in Schuyler's repertoire include My Old Yellow Car, A Love Like That, Years After You, You Can't Stop Love and Nothin' Like Fallin' In Love. Thom's song A Little More Love, composed with friend J. Fred Knobloch and recorded by Kenny Rogers, appeared on the much-lauded USA For Africa project in the mid 1980's. Thom has received 3 Songwriter of the Year nominations from The Nashville Songwriters Association and was inducted into The Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame in October 2011. Along with friends J. Fred Knobloch and Don Schlitz, Thom created the In-the-Round format of songwriter shows at the world-famous Bluebird Café' in Nashville. In recent years Schuyler and Knobloch have been joined by Hall of Fame songwriter, Tony Arata and harmonica virtuoso, Jellyroll Johnson to continue these performances on a monthly basis, uninterrupted since 1985 – each show a sellout. He returned to Alabama as Rector of St. James Parish, Eufaula, Alabama. Following the march from Selma to Montgomery, he directed an inter-faith ministry of Jewish, Unitarian, and Christian adjudicators who had come together in Selma to march. After the landmark law suit Wyatt vs Stickney halted the warehousing of mentally handicapped adults in mental institutions, Francis's civil rights concerns shifted focus to the mentally handicapped. He organized and operated group homes in Birmingham, Alabama, for mentally handicapped adults based on the principal of normalization.

Allan Wolf, *Youth Workshop Instructor/Performer, Week 3*, PERFORMING ARTS FUND, ELIZABETH CREIGHTON SPICKARD SCHUMANN FUND & WILLIAM DUNN TRABUE FAMILY FUND. The American Library Association's Booklist magazine has named Allan Wolf's *The Watch that Ends the Night* one of The 50 Best YA Books of All Time. An author and performance poet living in Asheville, NC, Wolf has twice received the North Carolina YA Book Award. Allan spent fifteen years as the educational director of Poetry Alive!, and he is considered one of the founding fathers of the National Poetry Slam movement. Winner of the prestigious Claudia Lewis Poetry Award from Bank Street College, Wolf's poetry has appeared in many diverse publications from Lady Bug Magazine to the North Carolina Literary Review. Wolf's many books showcase his love of history, research, and poetry. Titles include *Zane's Trace*, *New Found Land*, *More Than Friends* (with Sara Holbrook), *The Blood-Hungry Spleen*, and *Immersed in Verse*. His latest verse novel, *Who Killed Christopher Goodman?*, is based on the 1979 murder of a high school friend.
