Please respect the designated age groups specified for particular workshops and do not request exceptions. Most Adult workshops are also appropriate for mature teens, and in some cases for children as young as ten if accompanied by a registered parent, so please also see Adult Workshop listings.

#### #1 “Ringers and Singers Youth Choir- *Eagles & Eaglets only* (Weeks 2-7)

Lead by Judith Simmons Humphreys - 9:15am-10:00am Tuesday and Wednesday mornings in the Warren Chapel-bells begin at 9:15am and singing at 9:30am; participating in Twilight Prayers on Wednesday evenings.

#### #2 Harmony Bell Choir (Weeks 1-8)

Assembly member, Pam Maloof, will teach children how to play hand bells for ages 3-5, 2:30pm-3:00pm Tuesday and Thursday afternoons in Warren Chapel. Using a “harmony” bell system children will create beautiful music by using color coded cards with accompanying CD music. Encouraging the love of music at an early age is the goal for every child. All children are welcomed to participate!

#### #3 Caving trips with Joey Favaloro (Weeks TBA)

Equipment needed for caving trips: Strong flashlight with new batteries; if the flashlight can be attached to the helmet the caving adventure will be easier. Also, a back-up flashlight is recommended. Protective shoes or boots; no sandals or flip flops. Long pants; jeans preferred and a long-sleeved shirt. Gloves, knee pads, helmet (bike helmet permitted), bottled water, large towel, sack lunch + snacks.

#### #4 Nickajack Bat Cave Canoe Tour – Family Excursion (Week 1) \* Friday, June 16 at 5:30pm-9:00pm

Outdoor Chattanooga hosts a guided and equipped canoe trip to Nickajack Cave, where thousands of endangered gray bats come each summer to raise their young. We will begin with essential canoeing instruction for the novice paddler and set out for a short paddle to the mouth of the cave at dusk and watch the bats fly to start their nightly feeding. Boats anchor just off the cave entrance to view the emerging bats. Visitors should be careful not to shine beamed lights of any kind on the bats during emergence as it affects the bats and the viewing. A short return paddle in the twilight tops off the experience. No public admittance within the cave is allowed. This special trip is appropriate for the entire family, adults and kids ages 5 and older. Picnic suppers are encouraged.

Time: 7:30pm-10:00pm, EST; departing Auditorium at 5:30pm, CST and returning to MSSA approximately 9:00pm, CST.

Cost: \$20 per adult and \$10 for children under 13 years of age.

Limit: **Only 14 participants in canoes**; other attendees may watch the bats fly from the near-by dock & shore.

PADDLER REQUIREMENTS: Beginner friendly. At least one "adult" (18+) must be in each boat. Children must be at least 5 years old and 50 lbs. (minimum for weight range on our PFD's). Young children may be seated in the center floor of the canoe (one/canoe), older children typically take the bow seat but will need to participate in paddling forward. Individuals may be paired with other individuals or a guide. Personal Flotation Devices (PFD) are required and provided.

#### #5 Adventure Week (Week 2) \*

##### Overview & Philosophy

Adventure Week is a chance to sample many different outdoor activities. The MSSA's unique location atop the Cumberland Plateau provides a rich natural playground for climbers, hikers, swimmers, cavers, and nature

enthusiasts. Regardless of skill level or experience, participants can learn the basics of outdoor recreation. Each day of the week will have a theme (Rock, Earth, Trail, Water, Air) that inspires the activities being offered. This is a great chance for kids and families to more closely explore our natural neighborhood. Please refer to the descriptions of each activity for more details.

## **MONDAY: ROCK**

### **Morning Adventure: Bouldering**

Bouldering is climbing without ropes, low to the ground, using pads to fall on.

**Who?** Buzzards, Falcons, Eagles (preferably accompanied by an adult)

**Where?** Location weather dependent (Morgan's Steep most likely)

**Pack?** Water, snacks, (climbing gear can be provided)

### **Afternoon Adventure: Rock Climbing**

Roped climbing on nearby sandstone bluffs.

**Who?** (12 participants) Buzzards, Falcons, Eagles (preferably accompanied by an adult)

**Where?** Location weather dependent

**Pack?** Water, snacks, (climbing gear can be provided)

## **TUESDAY: EARTH**

### **Morning Adventure (plus optional afternoon extension): Bridal Veil Falls + Caving Trip**

Hike to a waterfall, explore a sinkhole, and stay later for a cave if desired

**Who?** All ages welcome for Bridal Veil hike, Buzzards + Falcons for 2<sup>nd</sup> half of trip

**Where?** Bridal Veil Falls sinkhole and cave, Sewanee

**Pack?** Picnic lunch if desired, water, clothes that can get wet & dirty

\*\*Those returning after the hike need to arrange transportation back

## **WEDNESDAY: TRAIL**

### **Morning Adventure: SAS Trails**

Hike to Piney Point or bike some of the SAS trails

**Who?** (No limit) All ages for hike. Those wishing to bike should be 12+ and have a bike.

**Pack?** Water, hiking shoes, bike (if applicable)

### **Afternoon/Overnight: Campout (fee - \$10)**

Hike down to the MSSA campsite, build a campfire, cook dinner, spend the night or shuttle back

**Where?** Stage Coach Campground

**Pack?** Backpack with clothes, water, flashlight, blanket or sleeping bag or hammock

### **Afternoon Adventure: Sycamore Falls hike + swim**

A casual hike down into Fiery Gizzard to see a waterfall, swimming + jumping optional

**Who?** All Ages (extra adults accompanying younger kids is advised)

**Where?** Fiery Gizzard

**Pack?** Towel, water

1. MSSA gate tickets are required for ALL workshop participants. Non-Assembly residents must purchase gate tickets in order to participate in any/all Assembly workshops, whether registration is required or not. Please present your MSSA gate ticket at each workshop session.
2. Registration for workshops must be made at the MSSA business office during office hours: 8:00am-4:00pm, Monday – Friday, and 9:00am-3:00pm, Saturday during the summer program season.
3. Where a fee is required, no names will be added to a workshop registration list without accompanying payment by cash, check or credit card.
4. In all cases, except as noted, refunds will be made only if cancellation is received at least 48 hours prior to the workshop **AND** a replacement participant can be secured from the waiting list. Otherwise, no refund will be given.

Surrounded by twelve US destroyers, which were depth-charging his submarine to drive it to the surface, Captain Vitali Grigorievitch Savitsky panicked. Unable to contact Moscow and fearing war had begun, he ordered the launch of his submarine's nuclear torpedoes. As the two sides inched perilously close to nuclear war — far closer than we ever knew before — just one man stood between Captain Savitsky's order and mutually assured destruction. Set over four hours on October 27, 1962, when the Cuban Missile Crisis was at its most perilous, this program tells the powerful but forgotten story of Vasili Arkhipov and Soviet Submarine B-59. With most of the action set in a claustrophobic submarine running out of air, The Man Who Saved the World, combines tense drama with eyewitness accounts and expert testimony about some of the most critical events in the Cold War.
